




What is The National Centre for Computing Education?

- Encourages deep understanding through models, up-to-date software and practical resources and hardware.




Key Stage 1 Progression Map



Key Stage 2 Progression Map



- ProjectEVOLVE resources each of the 330 statements from UK Council for Internet Safety's (UKCIS) framework “Education for a Connected World” with perspectives, research, activities, outcomes and supporting resources.



Sophisticated Progression across year groups:

- Year 1

I can give examples of when I should ask permission to do something online and explain why this is important.	I can use the internet with adult support to communicate with people I know (e.g. video call apps or services).	I can explain why it is important to be considerate and kind to people online and to respect their choices.	I can explain why things one person finds funny or sad online may not always be seen in the same way by others.

- Year 6

I can explain how sharing something online may have an impact either positively or negatively	I can describe how to be kind and show respect for others online including the importance of respecting boundaries regarding what is shared about them online and how to support them if others do not.	I can describe how things shared privately online can have unintended consequences for others. e.g. screen-grabs.	I can explain that taking or sharing inappropriate images of someone (e.g. embarrassing images), even if they say it is okay, may have an impact for the sharer and others; and who can help if someone is worried about this.
